### President Lincoln’s Cottage

Visitor Education Center:

1. Look at the exhibit about the Soldiers’ Home in the atrium. Who was the senator that introduced the bill that established the “Military Asylum” (later known as the Soldiers’ Home)?
2. The Lincolns moved to the Soldiers’ Home in the summer of 1862 to mourn the death of whom?
3. On what date did Lincoln read the first draft of the preliminary Emancipation Proclamation to his cabinet?
4. In the special exhibit, *My Abraham Lincoln*, find the “Lincoln Funeral Program with Mourning Fan and Case.” Who would have purchased such items around the time of Lincoln’s death?

Cottage Tour:

1. Listen to the story in the Drawing Room, what was the name of the British gentleman who visited Lincoln unexpectedly at the Cottage?
2. What were three of the four border states that Lincoln found so important to keep in the Union during the war?
3. When was the last time President Lincoln came to the Soldiers' Home?

### **Ford's Theatre**

1. Rail Trip: Name the detective who was charged with ensuring Lincoln's safe arrival in Washington.
2. Lincoln's Cabinet: Who was Abraham Lincoln's Secretary of State and what was his relationship to President Lincoln during the election of 1860?
3. Year of Decisions: Identify three out of the four election artifacts from 1864 that showcase Lincoln's image.
4. Conspiracy: What was the address of Mary Surratt's Boarding House on the night of the assassination?
5. Conspiracy: From what year is the appointment book from that also served as John Wilkes Booth's diary during his flight from Washington after the assassination?
6. The Last Speech: Who made the suit and overcoat Abraham Lincoln wore on the night of his assassination?
7. Name all of the former presidents who appear in "The Gettysburg Address" video.

**BONUS QUESTION-** In the Conspirators section, there is a playbill for Ford's Theatre that has John Wilkes Booth in the starring role. What is the name of the show?

**Ford's Theatre Society- Located at 511 10<sup>th</sup> ST NW. between E and F streets**

Since reopening in 1968, more than a hundred years after President Abraham Lincoln's assassination, Ford's Theatre has celebrated Lincoln's legacy and explored the American experience through theatre and education. Operated through a partnership between Ford's Theatre Society and the National Park Service, Ford's Theatre gives nearly one million visitors each year a high quality historic and cultural experience. **President Lincoln Cottage- Located on the Armed Forces Retirement Home (AFRH) campus in northwest Washington, D.C. Entrance is at Eagle Gate which is at the intersection of Rock Creek Church Road, NW and Upshur Street NW, 20011. This is the only open gate. There is no official street address.**

Designated a National Monument by President Clinton in 2000, President Lincoln's Cottage served as Lincoln's family residence for a quarter of his presidency and is the most significant historic site directly associated with Lincoln's presidency aside from the White House. President Lincoln's Cottage was restored by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, a private, non-profit organization and opened to the public for the first time in 2008.
